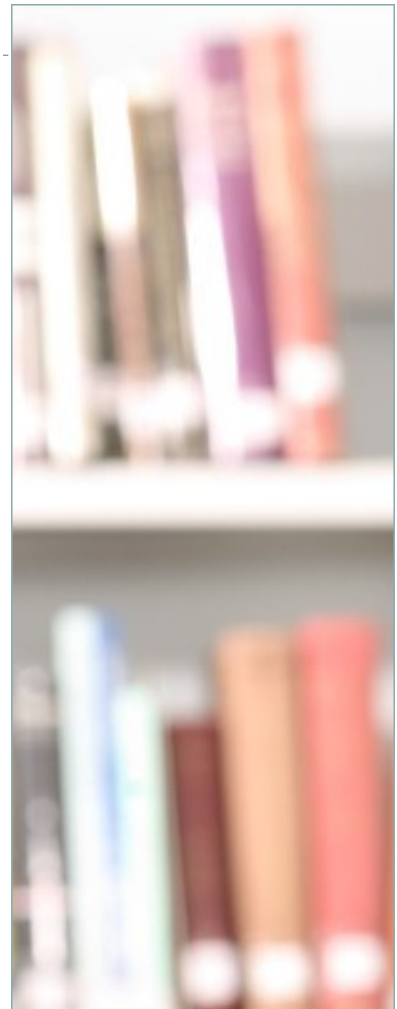
Ya comenzamos otro gran año escolar. Gracias a todos por su paciencia y cooperación.

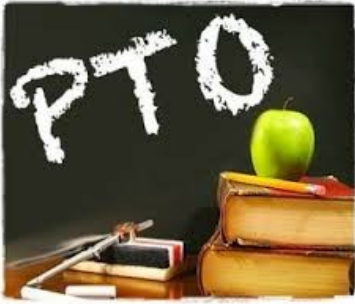

We have a lot planned this fall, beginning with the

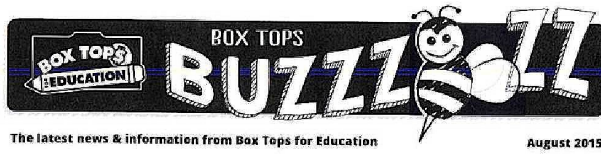

Small groups meet during the school year for students in need of academic or social support, anger management, conflict resolution, changing families, or those students affected by grief or loss. Driftwood also participates with the Listener and Mentor program. ## Mrs. Justin's Helpful Hint

### Screens and Sleep do not Mix Well

An article in the Miami Herald written by Julie Bay discussed the results of professionals specializing in sleep disorders, and the damage that electronic devices can do to children, affecting their sleep patterns and potentially leading to a wide variety of health problems.

Studies show that use of a device even an hour before bed (including cellphones and TV) stimulates kids brains, with the bright blue screen light having a lasting effect and preventing sleep. The result: Children, the age group that needs sleep the most, are getting less sleep these days, which leads to irritability, lack of concentration, depression and obesity.

Some recommendations for parents are:

- Keep devices and televisions out of kids' bedrooms
- Set boundaries on electronic usage (The American Academy of Pediatrics advises limits of two hours per day)
- Make sure children get 10 hours of sleep each night


