Welcome back to school! The 2016-2017 year is off to a great start. We're excited to welcome Ms. Sofianos, who is new to Driftwood, and Ms. Kefalas, who previously taught fourth grade, to the fifth grade team.

Although school has only been in session for a few weeks, our students are already hard at work! A professional school counselor is trained in both educating and counseling, allowing the counselor to function as a facilitator between parents, teachers, and the student in matters concerning the student's goals, abilities, and any areas needing improvement. Mrs. Justin provides services not only to students in need, but is available to all students.

Mrs. Justin can meet with parents to discuss students who are having difficulty with academics, behavior or family stress due to separation, divorce or other circumstances. Small groups meet during the school year for students in need of academic or social support, anger management, conflict resolution, changing families, or those students affected by grief or loss. Driftwood also participates with the Listener/Mentor program and can assist with food resources if your family is struggling in this area. Parent Character Education Tips:

These ideas and activities can help you teach your child to understand the importance of cooperation. Learning how to cooperate will help with success in school, in relationship with friends and in life over all. It is essential to remember that cooperation is a basic life skill that assists us in working together so that collaboration and creativity will ultimately being about success.

Ideas to Do as a Family

• Have your child share with you about times they worked with someone else to make or do something. Emphasize that working together requires compromise and listening to others' ideas.

• Share with your child about something you did that required cooperation. Explain how you worked together with others.

• Schedule household chores at a time when all members of the family can work together to finish them.

• "Catch" your child cooperating and offer your encouragement by verbally showing your appreciation.

• Initiate a family project or activity that all family members can have a role.

• Select a hobby that interests the family and invite all family members to work together.

• Watch a movie or TV program together and discuss how the characters cooperated with each other.

• Volunteer as a family to do a community service project together.

• Remember that the best teaching tool is to always model the behavior you want your child to learn.

• What do you have to do so that you listen carefully to others?

- Can you name a time that you compromised during conflict?
- How can you encourage your child to do the very best?

• Ask yourself; is my child able to get along with others? How can I help him/her improve?

• Observe or ask the teacher whether your child participates well ingroup activities.





Hello! My name is Teresa Moran, and I am the new literacy coach here at Driftwood Elementary. My job is to help the teachers with anything related to Reading, Social Studies, and Language Arts. Please do not hesitate to contact me at: Teresa.Moran@browardschools.com if you have any specific questions regarding ELA.

Driftwood Elementary is off to a great start in ELA! We are currently in the midst of an assessment to determine how we can help your students close gaps and progress in reading. The assessment is called the Benchmark Assessment System (BAS). The assessment requires your child to read aloud to a teacher and engage in a comprehension conversation regarding the book read. Additionally, there is a writing component where the teacher can select teaching targets based off of the data for instruction. Once your child receives their independent reading level, the teacher will relay this information to you. This information will aide you in helping to select appropriate books that your child can read independently. Once you obtain this level, you can utilize and download the app called, "Level It," which will allow you to scan the barcodes of books to determine the guided reading level. This can be found in the app store on your device.

In fourth and fifth grade, we are actively participating in Document Based Questioning (DBQ). Document Based Questioning are primary and secondary sources that revolve around our social studies standards. In fifth grade, we have just finished the document analysis that centers around the essential question, "Early Jamestown: Why Did So Many Colonists Die?" Stay tuned for the informative writing your child will bring home as it relates to this subject. Please ask your child about why so many early colonists died. In fourth grade, we have just finished up the DBO that focuses in on the essential question, "Hurricanes: Why are They So Dangerous?" Your child will be bringing home an informational writing piece on this subject very soon. Please ask your student about why hurricanes are so dangerous.

Thank you for all that you do with your child, including encouraging him/her to read at night. Remember, reading comprehension is a skill that can be acquired through consistent practice

outh violence and victimization has become a growing concern for our entire community. Whether it is bullying, gang activity, date rape, sexual assault or youth crime and juvenile delinquency, it is affecting our youngest and most vulnerable citizens.

- Act as role models, settle conflicts nonviolently.
- Take an active role in their children's school; talk regularly with teachers; volunteer
- Maintain two-way communication with their children; talk with them about violence they may have witnessed.
- Do not keep firearms or keep them safely • stored and locked up with ammunition stored separately.
- Initiate or participate in community or school violence prevention groups.
- Monitor/supervise their children's use of the • internet, television, reading material, movies, music, and video games.
- Seek out support groups to improve parenting skills and manage anger, if needed.

- Establish and enforce household rules and reward positive behavior.
- Demand involvement in violence prevention programs initiated by schools and communities and in disciplinary actions imposed on their own children.
- Supervise the activities of their children; know their schedule and their friends.
- Urge their children to participate in organized after-school activities provided by responsible groups.
- Practice zero tolerance for bullying in the family and take proactive steps to eliminate bullying in school.
- Provide foster homes and safe havens for abused children.
- Encourage community service.
