OVERVIEW

2016-2017 EDUCATIONAL EQUITY ACT PLAN The School Board of Broward County, Florida

The responsibilities of the Florida Department of Education, Office of Equal Educational Opportunity (OEEO) include compliance oversight of the Florida Educational Equity Act, Section 1000.05, Florida Statutes, and other federal and state legislation relating to equity in education.

The Florida Educational Equity Act (FEEA), and other federal and state legislation such as Title IX, Title VI, Title II (ADAAA), Section 504, prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age or marital status against students and employees. The annual Educational Equity Update is a reporting tool that enables the OEEO to monitor and ensure adherence to provisions of the laws, and that educational resources are equitably distributed.

The FEEA became law in June 1984, and the Implementing Rules 6A-19.001 – 19.010 were adopted by the State Board of Education in February 1985. The Equity Act was amended in 1993 to mandate stronger monitoring and enforcement for gender equity in athletics and again in 2002 to clarify responsibilities for the K-20 education system. Rule 6A-19.004, Interscholastic, Intercollegiate, Club and Intramural Athletics, was amended in September 1994 to reflect the new monitoring and enforcement requirements.

For 2016-2017, Districts will continue to focus on increasing minority enrollment in Advanced Placement (AP), including International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certification of Education (AICE), Dual Enrollment (DE), Honors and other Level 3 courses. The Districts should evaluate progress over the last five-year period, from 2012-13 to 2016-17. In addition, beginning with 2016-2017, Districts are required to report enrollment data for students identified as English Language Learners (ELL). The plan is divided into seven (7) parts and includes the following:

Also, Socio Economic Status (SES) Bands are indicated to provide schools with student data that can assist in creating access for all programs. Recently, CTACE in conjunction with the Economic Workforce Boards of the country, hosted a 1,000 plus student event for students to participate in resume writing, job exploration, and networking. Over 50% of these students were minority and/or economically disadvantage. The district has also been awarded the Out of School Youth Grant, Grow Your Own Future Grant, and Adults with Disabilities. These grants emphasize employability and access to post – secondary opportunities and job placement for students with economic and unique needs.

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in AP/IB/AICE courses. In 2012-13, 34% of Whites, 16% of Blacks, and 29% of Hispanics, 30% of White Male, 12% of Black Male, and 25% of Hispanic Male were enrolled. In 2016-17, 36% of Whites (an increase of 2 percentage points), 16 % of Blacks (0 percentage points), 30 % of Hispanics (an increase of 1 percentage points), 31 % of White Males (an increase of 1 percentage points), 11 % of Black Males (a decrease of 1 percentage points), and 26 % of Hispanic Males (an increase of 1 percentage points) were enrolled.

The evaluation does not reveal progress in increasing enrollment in AP/IB/AICE courses for Black and Hispanic students in grade 9-12th. Black students percentage points stayed the same, from 16% in 2012-13 to 16 % in 2016-17; Hispanic students did increased by 1 percentage points, from 29% to 30 % for the same time period.

Strategies for Continued Elimination of Enrollment Gaps:

- The high school AP team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students enrolled in Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses in grade 9-12.
- 2. The high school AP team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students enrolled in Dual Enrollment courses.
- 3. The high school AP team will identify achievement gaps in incoming 9th grade students. In conjunction with the middle schools they will develop strategies to narrow and eliminate these gaps at the middle school level.
- 4. Continued use of AP Potential for identification of AP ready students and subsequent enrollment in AP courses.
- 5. Develop a District monitoring tool and reporting procedures for AP enrollment in low income schools. Ensure schools have properly placed all students in appropriate AP courses using the AP Potential tool.
- 6. Encourage and support school based initiatives to increase parent awareness of AP, IB and AICE courses.
- 7. AP teachers will participate in the Local Advanced Placement Credentialing program which focuses on and improve teacher content-area knowledge and advanced pedagogical practices.

Accountability Measures:

- 1. Develop procedures to create and monitor individual school AP enrollment at the beginning of the school year. Ensure all AP Potential students are enrolled in the appropriate AP course.
- 2. Continually monitor AP enrollment to measure corrections in AP enrollment through the use of school enrollment reports.
- Develop a District assessment tool to assist schools in evaluating their Advanced Placement Program.

The Talent Acquisition & Operations (Non-Instructional) team fosters a recruitment and employment model designed to ensure exceptional efforts are carried out to identify a diverse applicant pool. Further, in our efforts to fill administrative positions, we utilize specialized sourcing platforms to assist in recruitment efforts which includes working closely with outside organizations like Council of Great City Schools, BROAD (Urban Education) and other recruitment outlets. participate in various job fairs and other events working closely with individuals with disabilities and veterans. During the 2016-2017 School Year, the District implemented a Leader Tracking System, which further supports our efforts to monitor future leaders for employment opportunities. In addition, we utilize colleges and universities to promote employment opportunities for a diverse applicant pool. In our efforts to maintain continuous improvement, our District will

continue to utilize various outlets to ensure we address any ethnic or gender underrepresentation we may encounter.

Talent Acquisition & Operations (Instructional)

The best practices related to recruiting, preparing, hiring or retaining teachers of color

- Visit Colleges/Universities: Visit historically black colleges/universities; target other universities that have large minority populations
- Urban City Interviews: We review and evaluate applicant data to determine the cities where our candidates live. We focus on urban cities where we typically attract a diverse pool of candidates. We target these cities and schedule city interviews/promotional events. The personal city visits allow us to meet with the candidates and/or groups of candidates to share information on teaching in Broward. The city interviews have proven successful especially with hiring teachers with relevant experiences similar to Broward.

 - o The Staffing department attends local community events that target minority populations (i.e. sorority, fraternity, churches, etc).
 - The campaign is geared to motivate current internal employees (i.e. substitutes and paraprofessionals) where we have a large minority population.
- Urban Teacher Academy Program (UTAP): UTAP implements innovations that support college access and success through an innovative "grow your own" teachers program that employs practices and strategies for high-need high school students to prepare for and graduate from college with a bachelor's degree. This "pre-service" equips these students to enter the teaching profession and be knowledgeable about the teaching skills required by a BCPS teacher. The

UTAP program is in high schools with a large minority population.

- Advertising & Marketing: Utilize social media platforms, print ads and job boards to recruit, network, and advertise. Social media (Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter). Print/online advertisements are posted in city newspapers, minority publications, college and professional publications. Advertisements are geared to specific groups, interest and demographics depending on the school and position.
- Build one to one relationships with candidates: Broward personally works with each recruit to find the right placement. It is important to match candidates with leaders where they can thrive as educators.
- Creating Ambassador Roles: Create a community of diverse teacher leaders who share experiences and backgrounds.

The District currently has three different locations that offer assistance and guidance to pregnant and parenting students (Charles Drew Resource Center is a part of Dave Thomas Education Center, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Seagull Alternative High School.) Contact persons for this area are: Ms. Tracy Lockhart-Talley, Principal, Charles Drew Resource Center/Dave Thomas Education Center, Bardetta D. Haygood, Principal, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Mr. Bonnie Clemon, Principal, Seagull Alternative High School. The following pages provides the District's response to the above three (3) questions from each location:

Charles Drew Resource Center/Dave Thomas Education Center

1. The Teen Parent Program at Charles Drew Resource Center is a part of Dave Thomas Education Center, an alternative school that provides an educational opportunity for parenting teens in the north end of Broward County. A small staff instructs students in grades 7-12 in all subjects required for promotion and high school graduation. A competency-based curriculum, aligned to state standards, is used for students to earn credits and prepare students for assessments such as; FCAT, FSA and EOCs. Additionally, each student receives 15-20 minutes of whole group instruction that focuses on a specific standard or area of concern at the beginning of each class. Through this program the students are able to work at his/her pace to complete courses required for graduation.

Additionally, the students have the luxury of having their child(ren) on the campus while they are receiving their education. The teen parent child(ren) receives free quality childcare from our caregivers in the school's nursery. Learning is extended to the babies of the teen mothers through the use of a Creative Curriculum that prepares them for Head start.

Other on-site staff includes a guidance counselor, speech pathologist, ESE specialist, child development center director, security specialist, and campus monitor. A full-time registered nurse and a part-time social worker work collaboratively to ensure students are receiving in-house referrals as well as outside agencies referrals to address their various needs, i.e.: WIC, Food Stamps, Child Support, supportive counseling, parenting and childbirth education classes, an established and close working relationship between the director and the teen parents and a healthy start coordinator for parenting skills, child birth, and 'mommy and me' classes.

2. The district social worker and the school's social worker continually communicate with home school staff about referrals into the program. Members of the guidance team conduct presentations that explain the program to schools in our feeder pattern. The school's website and brochures are used to inform the public about the offerings available in the program.

3. Our School counselors and administrators receive ongoing staff development from district staff, school social worker, Amanda's Place staff and the Health Start nurse. These trainings provide staff with the necessary tools to address the various needs of our teen parent population.

Henry D. Perry Education Center

- 1. The pregnant and parenting students attending Henry D. Perry Education Center are enrolled in our Alternative High School. Students work at their own pace and receive support from their teachers. Coursework is modified and students are remediated until successful. We offer child care services through our Little Learners Child Development Center for students enrolled in our daytime Alternative High School program. The infants and toddlers receiving care are from ages 6 weeks to 5 years. Students receive door-to-door transportation through BCPS and receive a car seat at the time of registration. Onsite social services and health care include:
 - Full-time school Social Worker
 - Full-time Family Counselor
 - Academic Guidance Counselor
 - Memorial Health Mommy and Me services which includes parenting activities, Mommy and Me activities, group and individual counseling
 - Monthly seminars and workshops geared toward parenting skills, social and emotional support, college and career readiness, drug and alcohol prevention, drowning prevention
 - Students and their children receive a full breakfast and lunch daily. The children who are age appropriate also receive a snack daily.
 - All children enrolled in the Little Learners Child Development Center receive instruction with the use of Creative Learning and Frog Street curricula.
- 2. The home school advises students of the programs offered here at Henry D. Perry Education Center and refers students to our site. Additionally, information can be obtained via our school website henrydperryeducationcenter.com, at the time of registration, students meet with both the grade level Guidance Counselor and the school Social Worker. At that time, all services are arranged and academic coursework is aligned to the students' specific needs to ensure graduation cohort requirements are being met. Students enrolled in our daytime Alternative High School program are the beneficiaries of free childcare services.

3. Henry D. Perry Education Center is an Alternative High School, which offers a teen parent and childcare component to provide students with the opportunity to complete their high school education and earn a high school diploma. All counselors and administrators are well versed in the program offerings, as we are the district's alternative center serving the southern portion of Broward County. Ongoing training is provided through district workshops and on-site professional development. All counselors, administrators, and caregivers are certified and/or licensed according to Broward County Public Schools requirements.

Seagull Alternative High School

- A. The district has a program in place for pregnant and parenting students at Seagull Alternative High School located in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. The program is designed to provide an academic option for students who may be over-age for grade level, deficient in credits/GPA and/or need of child care.
 - B. Through its Child Development Center teen parents are provided the opportunity to continue to earn their high school diploma while their babies (six weeks to five years old) are cared for and provided an education to prepare them for head start, VPK, or Kindergarten. Ancillary and Social Services are available on campus and provides students with case management and education in:

Prenatal Nutrition

Childbirth

Breastfeeding

Parenting

Developmental testing for the babies

Additionally: These is a full-time nurse on campus daily. Storks Nest is a partnership with Zeta Phi Beta Sorority that provide teen parents with self-development and child development training. Women of Tomorrow provide teen parents with mentorship and self-development services. Several courses in pre-natal care, child safety, and child development is provided by Broward Health.

- 2. A. Seagull distributes an annual Brochure and a quarterly Child Care Newsletter that details the programs and options available to our students.
- 3. A. Seagull's Child Care Development Center is a Broward County Schools facility and is bound by the operational and professional policies and regulations developed by the Broward County Public Schools. Therefore; all staff members are professionally trained and certified by the Florida Department of Education, and the Department of Children and Families. Seagull is also licensed by County of Broward Licensing Division and is randomly inspected by them to make sure personnel and all standards are in compliance with the county's licensing regulations.
