Parents, thank you for your participation in last month's During the presentation, I supplied Title I night. participants with a list of resources that Apollo students are asked to use in and out of the classroom. Parents are expected to encourage students to use all of the online resources while in class, before and after school in the Media Center and, if necessary, sign up for tutoring. 


### Title I News & Events:

The Title I Department is pleased to announce that 147 parents and students attended this year's Math

Family Night, that took place on Thursday, November 12th. Nineteen faculty and staff members supported, facilitated instruction or volunteered at the family night and we want to thank everyone that participated. School Improvement Plan (SIP) for 2015-2016 and Title I Addendum: School staff and parents jointly develop the SIP, which includes yearly objectives and activities that we will implement into our curriculum at all grade levels. The Title I Addendum is a Comprehensive Needs Assessment with information about the academic achievement of students in relation to the state academic content standards. Broward County Public Schools has changed the website where this information can be accessed. Currently, the Office of School Performance and Accountability (OSPA) implements initiatives such as the SIP to ensure curriculum and standardized assessments are centered on each school providing a high quality education. OSPA also funds the A+ Rewards School Recognition Program that qualifies many Florida public schools' financial rewards. The reward is for schools that demonstrate sustained or significantly improved student performance, receive an A grade or schools that improve at least one performance grade category.
