An ongoing process through which teachers and administrators work collaboratively to seek and share learning and to act on their learning, their goal being to enhance their effectiveness as professionals for students' benefit (Hord, 1997) A strategy to increase student achievement by creating a collaborative school culture focused on learning (Feger & Arruda, 2008). An inclusive group of people, motivated by a shared learning vision, who support and work with each other to inquire on their practice and together learn new and better approaches to enhance student learning (Stoll, Bolam, McMahon, Thomas, Wallace, Greenwood et al., 2005).

11. What reliable research studies, proven strategies, best practices, or similar programs support the probable success of the proposed waiver?

Several possible impacts of additional PSD's might be expected. The first of these possible impacts, a negative effect due to loss of contact time, is direct and can be expected to appear in the school year in which it is realized. That is, if contact time is lost in the 2007-08 school year, it is reasonable to expect that the impact of this loss will show up in the same school year. This study established that there has been no measurable negative impact of the implementation of PSD on student outcome measures. The second of these possible impacts, a positive effect due to the increased knowledge, skills, collaboration, etc. of the teachers, is a multi-stage effect. It is reasonable to assume that it takes a significant amount of time for training, collaboration, and planning activities to affect classroom activities and for changed classroom activities to affect student performance. Therefore, the lack of a positive impact on school grades and student outcome measures in the year or the year after implementation of PSD does not indicate that there will not be such an impact. The results of the Customer Survey indicate that the faculty in the schools that implemented PSD in 2006-07 (either in one or both years) tended to be more positive in 2007-08 than the faculty in schools with no PSD participation on the questions utilized in this update. This update has established that the feared loss of achievement due to a loss of student contact hours, as expressed by some of the teachers surveyed for the original status report, did not materialize in any measurable manner. The presence of positive impacts of Professional Study Days are best measured by the techniques utilized and discussed in that report, and are not reasonable to expect to show up on school level measures.

• The number of 2017 ELA students who scored level 3 -5 for grades 6 -9 dropped slightly from the 2016 scores. The 6th grade dropped 1%, 7th grade 5%, 8th grade 1%, and 9th grade -6%. The additional Professional Study Days are being used to analyze and address the drop-in performance for these grades. With our change in schedule from a traditional seven-period day to an A/B schedule, teachers are working together to use the instructional time more efficiently and effectively. Our in-house monitoring data is showing student improvement in ELA. Our 2017 10th grade scores went up as compared to the 2016 scores. The number of tenth grade students scoring Level 3 - 5 went up 4%.

Civics

 Our seventh grade Civics students demonstrated significant improvement on the EOC in 2017 as compare to 2016. The percent of students scoring Level 3-5 went up 37%.

J.S. History

• The number of students scoring Level 3 - 5 on the U. S. History EOC went up almost 13%. The ability to plan together and share Best Practices has given teachers and students the opportunity to grow in both areas.
