The BTU Article 5, L1. The school calendar shall contain ten (10) planning days throughout each school year. Four (4) of these days shall occur at the beginning of the school year. On all planning days, teachers shall have one (1) hour for lunch.

8. State the waiver: change, delete, or add to the policy or contract so as to fulfill the requirements of the proposed waiver.

In addition to the six early release days currently scheduled, the District shall provide that the students at Coral Springs High School shall be dismissed three hours early (11:50AM) for eight additional days during the school year for the purpose of Professional Collaboration focused on student achievement and professional growth.

9. State the rationale for the proposed waiver. How will the proposed waiver support school improvement? Give background information, history of barrier, etc.

CSHS uses the district allocated planning days and early release days for professional development but the time is limited. Adequate additional time is necessary for collegial interaction, professional growth and continued student achievement. By providing faculty members with additional time for collegial interaction, faculty members will be able to collaborate in their content area professional learning communities with a focus on Florida Assessments and End of Course Exams. The success of this will translate into increased student achievement and professional growth among faculty.

10. Recognizing that one strategy alone does not affect school-wide achievement, identify and explain the baseline data for the proposed waiver.

The Coral Springs High School staff will evaluate the effectiveness of the professional study days for the two year period by evaluating student achievement data using the following data elements: 1. The percentage of failing grades as indicated by the grade summary reports. 2. The Florida School Accountability Reports. 3. The percentage of students making learning gains in reading.

11. What reliable research studies, proven strategies, best practices, or similar programs support the probable success of the proposed waiver?

The professional study days are specifically intended for content area professional learning communities to collaborate and share best practices. Providing this time for teachers aligns with the new evaluation tool and it's expectations of Collegiality and Professionalism. Domains 2 - 4 in the Marzano Growth Model, which is designed around years of research on effective teaching and learning practices, are expectations outside of the classroom setting.
