#### · Approval of minutes from our last SAC Meeting

Review and accept minutes from last SAC meeting January 23, 2019

Ms. Schneider motioned to accept, and Ms. Tobon seconded the motion. Motion passed.

#### Mid-Year data review – Intervention and Enrichment Support

Jumpstart and ESOL camp going well. Currently, a portion of students' time in these programs is utilized for standards review utilizing the i-Ready program. The goal is to increase students' time on task and accuracy scores within the program.

We have been using the data we obtained from BSA and i-Ready to analyze students' strengths and areas for remediation. Ms. Pontillo explained how the teachers are looking at the information to see which standards have and have not been covered up until this point. If the standard has been taught and the standard is still low the teachers use this information to reteach and review accordingly. However, standards that have not been covered yet will be reevaluated after they have been taught.

Mrs. Leeman pointed out that the BSA test is an online test, but this year the FSA test will be a paper-based test in both math and ELA. We aren't sure yet how this will affect the students' scores.

Ms. Pontillo reviewed how the question level and style on the FSA can vary, and the teachers will be reviewing with the students the steps needed in order to answer the variety of questions appropriately. Ms. Pontillo stated that she would bring a copy of some of the FSA examples for the next SAC meeting.

Ms. Pontillo pointed out that the parents are being asked by the Department of Education to give input into the new standards that Florida will be creating. Mrs. Tobon asked how to give that input and what kind of information parents should be sharing. Ms. Pontillo gave instructions on how parents can access the survey, and she went over the question that is being asked. The survey simply asks what you, as a parent, would like to see changed in the standards.

#### Mid-Year Report

Mid-year report was presented for parents to review. Ms. Pontillo asked that the report be taken home and looked over and at the next meeting any questions can be asked.

#### Smart Bond Updates

Ms. Pontillo gave an overview of the current state of the playground upgrades. About \$13,000 will be used for furniture and playground. The furniture will be replaced in the 5th grade. The tables that the students are currently using will be switched out for desk the students. Also, the furniture in the media center is very old and needs an update, so looking to spend about \$20,000 on this project. A Lakeshore representative has presented a plan and Ms. Pontillo will share this at the next SAC meeting. The furniture has strong reviews and comes with a lifetime warranty.

#### • Title I Funds

We are working together with Mrs. Kelleher to look into improving the Parent Resource Center with Title I funds.










# 4. I often receive information from my child's school about how my child scored on the state tests.



# 5. I often receive information from my child's school about what a score on the state tests means.





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


8. I often receive information from my child's school about how I can work with teachers to help my child succeed.










#### 22. The information from my child's school is easy to understand.




# 23. The information from my child's school is given in a language that I understand.






