

Social Studies

Social Studies has continued using document based questions to increase literacy throughout all grade levels. This month is Black History month which will be recognized in our classes. We would like to congrtulate H. Hill who won this year's Geography Bee.

Sixth Grade is finishing up on Rome. Within the next week the will be travelling across the ocean to Mesoamerica and northern cultures.

Our Math department continues their work towards FSA preparation. Our teachers are meeting in their PLC's to discuss our students scores and areas of weakness to best address the standards that have been covered and the standards that were noted in our SIP as our areas of weakness and concern.

In 6th grade, students completed their unit of study on Algebraic equations and expressions. In this unit students were asked to generate equivalent numerical and algebraic expressions and use them to solve real world problems. Our Advanced 6th grade students' test average was an 87%. With an 96% (158/164) of students passing with a 70% or above. Our Regular average was an 81%. With 88% (134/152)

calculating the area and circumference of a circle and solving real world problem and mathematical problems involving area of composite figures, and surface area of 3-D objects. We have made improvements in this category as 92% of our students have scored above a 60% on the first performance task.

In Advanced 7th grade Math, students completed their unit of study in Statistics and Probability. This is an area of weakness across the district. Our students are doing well so far, with 88% have scored above a 70% on the first performance task.

With an 96% 8th grade students (158/164) of students passing with a 70% or above. Our Regular 6th grade students' test average was an 81%. 8th grade students completed their unit of study on writing and solving Systems of Equations with 82% of our students scoring a 60% or above.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

To support the School Improvement Plan Mrs. Manning coordinated a PD for all grade level PLCs. On January 17th each grade level met with Ilianna Polatos-Quintero (our county science coach). During the PD teachers were acquainted with the wealth of literacy engagement opportunities embedded in our new textbooks. Each PLC will have a one hour follow-up session on March 6th.

Our eighth grade PLC is heavily engaged in exploring the classification of matter, energy transfer, and waves. The 8th Grade PLC will follow 6th Grade's example by administering a mid-point (more or less) exam to measure student mastery of Grade 8 standards.

Our sixth grade PLC 6th engaged students in a classwide debate. Students were placed in groups of 4-5 and had to convince someone to build their home on the mountain or island based on which was deemed the most environmentally friendly. Ms. Levine helped with some debate pointers. Additionally, a mid-term was administered to determine levels of student achievement to date. Science Fair Results:

Our seventh grade PLC finished their exploration of human body systems. Ms. Ferrante's classes engaged in PBL when they were challenged to design an amusement park for Weston based on their knowledge of human body systems. Students will now move into an exploration of heredity and genetics.

First place winners will compete at the County competition on Friday, February 8th. Thank you to Erin Magee for coordinating this school-wide event including our Science Fair Open House on January 23rd.

The ESOL students have finished the reading, writing and listening portions of the Access 2.0 testing for the 2019 school year The certified WIDA testers are currently working on the individual speaking portions of the test. The speaking section is done on a one on one basis and takes approximately 20-30 minutes per student. The Access 2.0 test scores are used to determine the students' language classification and their course placements for next year.

We have been approved and will be receiving funding from the ESOL department for Language Enrichment Camp. This program is for 10 weeks of afterschool tutoring for up to 50 ESOL students. The second 10 weeks of tutoring began on February 4th. We currently have 35 students enrolled in Language Enrichment Camp. Students are divided into three different groups according to their action area needs, which is determined with a placement test when they first log into Imagine Learning. The students use a variety of different programs such as Imagine Learning and ESL reading smart plus games and activities. The students have had an average usage of 17 hours with a scaled score increase of 106 points. They have been practicing decoding words and learning phonics skills along with comprehension.

In class we are working on determining the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text. We have been working on getting ready for the FSA writing test on April 2nd.

The ESOL Academic competition practice is well on it's way. The theme this year is "Navigating your way to Biliteracy." We currently have 28 members on our team. The competition is on April 27th at Piper High School. More information and results to follow.

Language Arts/Reading

Currently, the Literary Fair is taking place at TTMS. This is an opportunity for students to showcase their literary talents. Our ELA 6th graders have been reading biographies and other non-fiction texts, as well as creating biography posters about historical role models. We are also working on writing, especially increasing reading and writing stamina.

The 7th grade Cambridge ELA classes are collaborating with a class in India. Under the direction of Ms. Smith, the students are sending pictures of our school and daily life at Tequesta.

In 8th-grade, ELA students are preparing for our annual performance of "Living Voices: Through the Eyes of a Friend". Thank you, PTA, for graciously funding this literary event. Students are completing research projects on different aspects of WWII as well as performing roles from The Diary of Ann Franke. Additionally, students are sharpening their argumentative writing skills by analyzing specific body paragraph structure for this writing genre as well as learning to cite evidence using reliable sources to avoid plagiarism.

In 7th-grade reading classes, Mrs. Rosario reports the students' average Lexile scores for each period all fall within the "Approaching Grade Level" category, according to Achieve 3000. The average growth is that of a full year!! This also means we have met our SMART goal, so we now have plans to go above and beyond that goal.

The TTMS Speech & Debate Team was back in action in January competing in two tournaments! Big congrats to M. Dwyer and A. Graham, and D. Amaya and R. Alizo for winning rounds in Public Forum Debate and N. Foutch and G. Simpson for winning both rounds in PF at the January After School Tournament! First-time competitors J. Velasquez and S. Smith took 4th overall in Duo Interpretation at the Stallion Showdown Invitational in Coral Springs! The February MAST has been postponed until further notice, but the Cougars will be competing with 23 students entered in events! Stay tuned!
