SUBJECT: 2002 GRADING OF SCHOOLS

Today the Florida Department of Education released the 2001-2002 school grades. As you recall, this year the State dramatically revised the grading formula to include individual student learning gains. In addition, higher standards were applied in the scoring of the FCAT. I am pleased to report that the results are outstanding. **Overall districtwide grades assigned to our schools reflect dramatic increases in the number of schools earning the highest grades of A and B from 83 last year to 124 this year.** Specifically, as you will see in the chart below:

- 48_49 elementary, 20 middle, and 5 high schools, and one combination middle/high schools received a grade of A for a total of 73_75 schools, up from 61 last year, and
- <u>39_38</u> elementary, 7 middle, and 4 high schools received a grade of B for a total of <u>50_49</u> schools, up from 22 last year.

Equally as important as the number of schools earning the highest grades of A and B is the movement of schools up the grading ladder. That is, 41 (32%) elementary schools, 22 (59%) middle schools and 5 (19%) high schools improved their grade by at least one letter grade.

In reviewing the results by level, the greatest increase is found to be in the number of middle schools moving to a grade of A: from 5 last year to 20 this year. Furthermore, no middle school earned less than a C for 2001-2002.

Even with these results - a large number of school grades at the highest categories of A and B and the significant number of schools that increased at least one grade level - we know that the work is not finished. Nineteen Seventeen of our schools, 18 16 D and 1 F, still demand our intensive support. Steps are already underway to review the data and identify support needed to ensure increased learning gains for their students.

This report provides the percent of students: (1) meeting high

standards in reading, mathematics, and writing, (2) making learning gains in reading and mathematics, and (3) in the lowest 25% in reading in the school that make adequate progress. Additionally, attached is the 2002 School Accountability Report Guide Sheet that explains how school grades are determined.
