SUBJECT: 2002 SAT ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

This week, the report of SAT national, state, and district results was released by The College Board. Detailed information regarding individual school results has been included in this report.

The SAT is a comprehensive, standardized college entrance test used to provide information for college admission. The SAT measures verbal and mathematical abilities deemed critical for successful college academic performance and is administered at various times throughout the year. Students elect to take the SAT or ACT based on personal preference or requirements of the college(s) of their choice.

Highlights of the report indicate:

- The number of Broward students participating in SAT testing in 2002 (7,801) has increased by 19 percent over last year.
- Nearly half (11) of 24 Broward high schools reporting SAT participation for at least two years, earned higher scores in at least one section of the SAT.
- Of the 25 Broward high schools with reported data, over three-fourths (22) recorded a higher participation rate.
- Broward African American/Black students achieved average SAT scores equal to or higher than African American/Black students in Florida and across the nation in Mathematics.
- Broward Hispanic or Latino students earned higher SAT Verbal scores than students across the nation and higher Mathematics scores than students in Florida and across the nation.

As seen in the attached report and in the ACT report released earlier this month, the 2001-2002 school year evidenced the greatest number of Broward County Public School students participating in standardized, comprehensive college entrance exams. According to The College Board, the most important factor affecting the interpretation of college admission test scores is

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the participation rate. In some states, a limited number of college-bound seniors take the SAT. Typically, these students have strong academic backgrounds and are applicants to the nation's most selective colleges and scholarship programs. However, all students in Broward are encouraged to take college admission tests.

While student gains continue to be threatened by expanding areas of poverty, burgeoning student mobility, an increasingly diverse population of limited English speaking students, and continued severe overcrowding, Broward staff strive to provide the best education available to all students. As a result, Broward students continue to stabilize their gains across a wide area of assessments.

2002 SAT ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

The SAT I: Reasoning Test is a comprehensive, standardized college entrance test used to provide information for college admission. The instrument is designed to assess many of the skills that are important to students' success in college. The SAT is administered at various times throughout the year. Students elect to take the SAT or ACT based on the entrance requirements of the college(s) of their choice.

The SAT report is useful in placing student achievement in perspective and initiating educational plans for high school students. Broward high school guidance counselors use individual SAT results to assist students in making appropriate, timely and realistic post-secondary plans. School-based staff examine individual and school results and review other testing measures in a continuing effort to provide the most meaningful transition from school to career for all Broward students.

SAT Assessment Participation

This year again evidenced a significant increase in the number of Broward County Public Schools students taking standardized, comprehensive college entrance exams. According to The College Board, the most important factor affecting the interpretation of college admission test scores is the participation rate. In some states, a limited number of college-bound seniors take the SAT or ACT. Typically, these students have strong academic backgrounds and are applicants to the nation's most selective colleges and scholarship programs. In Broward, however, school staffs do not focus on select students but encourage all students to take college entrance examinations. A record number (7,801) of Broward's 2001-2002 high school seniors took the SAT.

While student gains continue to be threatened by expanding areas of poverty, burgeoning student mobility, an increasingly diverse population of limited English speaking students, and continued severe overcrowding, Broward staff strive to provide the best education available to all students. As a result, Broward students continue to stabilize their gains across a wide area of assessments.

According to The College Board, test results summarize information for seniors who took the SAT I Reasoning Test any time during their high school years through March 2002. If a student took a test more than once, the most recent score is used (The College Board, 2002).

SAT Assessment Results

Table 1 provides SAT participation rates and results for the district, state, and the nation. As three years of data is necessary to determine data trends, results are provided for 2000 through 2002. The number of students participating, as well as their overall average for the Verbal and Mathematics sections, are reflected in the table.

As indicated in Table 1, the number of Broward students participating in SAT testing in 2002 (7,801) has increased by 19 percent over last year. This significant 19 percent increase of Broward student participation in SAT testing surpassed the national participation rate increase of four percent (1,327,831), and the Florida student statewide SAT participation increase of nine percent (75,664) over 2001.

Broward students' average Verbal and Mathematics (475/489) scores do not meet those of students across Florida (496/499) and the nation (504/516). A negative trendline is seen in Broward's Verbal mean scores over the last three years (483, 479, 475). The slight decline of the average Verbal and Mathematics scores over the three year period may be a result of the significant increase in student population participating in the assessment. Broward Mathematics mean scores show mixed results for the same three-year period, slipping by six points in 2001 but rising by one point in 2002 (494, 488, 489).

Results by Ethnicity

As reported in Table 2, American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian and Hispanic/Latino students posted Verbal scores in 2002 equal to or higher than scores in 2001. Mathematics scores increased this year from the previous year for American Indian/Alaskan Native, Asian, White and Other ethnic groups. Note: "No Response" indicates that students did not designate an ethnic category when they completed their Student Descriptive Questionnaire (SDQ).

Table 2 illustrates three years of Broward data by ethnicity, Appendix A presents the percent of test takers and the average scores by ethnicity for the district, state, and the nation. As indicated by the appendix, Broward student ethnic demographics differ from the state and the nation.

- African American/Black students comprise over one-fourth (27%) of SAT test takers in Broward compared to 15 percent in Florida and 11 percent across the nation.
- Broward African American/Black students achieved average SAT scores equal to or higher than African American/Black students in Florida and across the nation in Mathematics.
- Hispanic or Latino students comprise 19 percent of SAT test takers in Broward compared to 17 percent in Florida, but are nearly double the percentage (10%) across the nation.
- Broward Hispanic or Latino students earned higher SAT Verbal scores than students across the nation and higher Mathematics scores than students in Florida and across the nation.
- White students in Broward recorded higher SAT Mathematics scores than students across the state.
- An SAT achievement gap is noted for Black and Hispanic when compared to White participants in both Verbal and Mathematics.

Individual School Results

Appendix B provides individual SAT school results for 25 Broward high schools and three charter schools. (Only two years of data are reported for William T. McFatter Technical, Pompano Beach Institute and North Lauderdale Academy Charter School as these schools did not have seniors participating in SAT assessment prior to 2001. Only one year of data is reported for Coral Springs and Pembroke Pines charter schools and the College Academy as these schools did not have seniors participating in SAT assessment prior to 2002.)

A review of individual school results finds that:

- Nearly half (11) of 24 Broward high schools, reporting SAT participation for at least two years, earned higher scores in at least one section of the SAT.
- Similarly, of the 25 Broward high schools with reported data, over three-fourths (22) reported a higher participation rate.

The *Profile of College Bound-Seniors*, which is sent to every high school, presents data for high school graduates who participated in the SAT Program during their high school years. The data in the report can be used to:

- Interpret scores of individual students within the broader context of data aggregated across groups of college-bound seniors;
- Study changes over time in the characteristics of students taking SAT I tests; and
- Look at year-to-year educational and demographic changes in student population, along with changes in test performance.
