SUBJECT: REVISED 2003-04 ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM RESULTS

Following the release of the 2003-04 Advanced Placement Program Results Report on February 2, 2005, an issue involving the number students enrolled in a specific Advanced Placement (AP) course and the percent of AP examinations administered was brought to the attention of district staff. Specifically, at schools which are (1) on a block schedule and (2) offer both AP Calculus AB and AP Calculus BC, there are a number of students who were enrolled in AP Calculus AB during the first semester of the 2003-04 school year and who were subsequently enrolled in AP Calculus BC during the second semester. However, these students did not participate in both the AP Calculus AB examination and the AP Calculus BC examination, as the College Board only permits students to take one of the AP examinations, either AB or BC – not both. The vast majority of these students participated in the AP Calculus BC examination, which is the higher level course. As a result of this issue, school participation rates in AP exams for block schools that offer both AB and BC Calculus were not accurately reflected on the 2004 Advanced Placement (AP) Recap Report and subsequently were not accurately reflected in the 2003-04 Advanced Placement Program Results Report released on February 2, 2005. The programming previously used by district staff to produce the AP Recap Report calculated student enrollment separately from exam participation, meaning that participation rates for the AP Calculus exams at the block schools where students were enrolled in both AP Calculus AB and AP Calculus BC were lower than they should be. The previous programming reported, for example, that there were 61 students enrolled in Calculus AB, but only 20 AP Calculus AB examinations were administered, for a 33 percent participation rate. However, for Calculus BC, 42 students were reported as enrolled in Calculus BC with 42 examinations administered for a 100 percent participation rate. This did not present an accurate picture, as some of the Calculus AB students took the Calculus AB examination, but some of the Calculus AB students participated in the Calculus BC examination.

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Once district staff was alerted of this, the programming used to produce the 2004 Advanced Placement (AP) Recap Report was corrected. The programming change now removes students from the Calculus AB enrollment if the student was subsequently enrolled in the AP Calculus BC course and sat for the Calculus BC examination. While this programming change resulted in fewer students being reported as enrolled in AP Calculus AB, it now more accurately reports the percent of examinations administered versus the actual number of students sitting for the examination. Consequently, the 2003-04 Advanced Placement Program Results report was revised to reflect the corrected participation rates, and the accurate data may be found in Appendix A for district results and in Appendix B for school-by-school results of the attached report. In addition, a scrivener's error has been corrected. The scrivener's error has been rectified as seen in Appendix D for Coral Springs High School, Charles Flanagan High School, and Coral Springs Charter School.

2003-04 ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM RESULTS

In keeping with Broward County Public Schools' goal of: All students will achieve at their highest potential, data for the 2003-04 school year show that significantly more Broward high school students continue to take advantage of the availability of Advanced Placement (AP) coursework each year. Review of the data for the past three school years demonstrates that both the number of students enrolled in AP courses and those taking AP examinations have risen dramatically in the time period. Furthermore, even with the increased number of students participating in the program, average scores reflected levels of performance in line with students statewide and globally and remained at a high level of performance this year. In addition, 100% of Broward County High Schools with 9th through 12th grade enrollments offer students access to the full complement of Advanced Placement core courses through on-site offerings or via distance learning opportunities. The three schools (Atlantic Technical, Everglades, and Monarch) that presently do not offer all of the core AP courses are continuing to add AP courses each year as these schools add grade levels to their high school programs. Furthermore, the majority of high schools provide AP course offerings that extend well beyond the core AP curriculum courses, with 27 schools (93%) offering nine or more AP courses and two high schools (Charles Flanagan and Stoneman Douglas) each offering 26 Advanced Placement courses to students.

Increasing student participation in rigorous coursework is strongly supported by the School Board of Broward County and the Superintendent of Broward County Public Schools, and as such, is included as an outcome measure on the Superintendent's annual evaluation instrument.

Background

The AP program is a nationally recognized, successful strategy for introducing students to the challenges of college-level work while they are still in high school. The AP program:

- is structured so that high schools can offer college level work in 35 courses covering 19 fields of study,
- provides an opportunity for students enrolled in AP courses and others who have completed related honors courses or studied independently to be examined on a level similar to college level course standards, and
- provides voluntary staff development for AP teachers through consultants, workshops, and publications by College Board staff.

AP examinations are scored on a scale ranging from one to five (1: no recommendation, 2: possibly qualified, 3: qualified, 4: well qualified, and 5: extremely well qualified). Higher education institutions worldwide award college credit or advanced placement to students for AP coursework, with each college or university deciding which AP examination score and course will be accepted. Most higher education institutions grant credit and/or advanced placement for AP scores of 3 or better. Therefore, the standard for competency has been defined as a score of 3 or above.

Students enrolled in AP courses in Broward County Public Schools are required under School Board Policy 6000.1 to participate in the AP examination. Students who believe they will be successful on the AP examinations based on participation in other rigorous academic curriculum, such as International Baccalaureate (IB) classes, may sit for the examination(s) even though they are not enrolled in AP courses.

Examination dates are determined by the College Board and are scheduled in May. Districts may not modify administration dates. Broward staff has requested an additional administration date in January to accommodate schools following a 4x4 block schedule. That request, however, has been denied.

Funding

The Broward County Public School District covers the cost of the AP examination for students enrolled in AP or IB courses. The College Board allows a fee reduction of \$22 per test for students who qualify for free/reduced lunch services. Currently, Broward students not enrolled in an AP class or IB class, home education students, and private school students are individually responsible for the cost of the assessments in which they participate.

District cost for the examinations during the 2003-04 school year was \$948,020. The Florida Department of Education (DOE) provides school district funding for the AP Program through an annual allocation based on test performance. Each AP examination scored 3 and above generates .24 FTE per student (\$918 per score of 3 or higher during the 2003-04 school year). A preliminary budget analysis indicates that Broward will receive approximately \$5,946,358 in AP funding for the 2004-05 school year.

Funding is then distributed to individual schools based on the number of test scores at 3 or above in that school. The allocation may be used for purposes of increasing student achievement in AP coursework by such methods as increasing access to pre-AP courses and distance learning programs, as well as providing staff development opportunities for participating teachers.


Findings - Global, Florida, and Broward

AP Enrollment and Number of Examinations Administered. Table 1 provides the number of students enrolled in AP courses and the number of AP examinations administered across the Globe, for Florida, and in Broward from 2001-02 through 2003-04. Chart 1 illustrates data for Broward only. Florida and Global data is from the *College Board AP Distribution Report*. Broward data reported in Table 1 and Chart 1 is from the *Broward County Advanced Placement Recap Report*.

During the three-year period depicted in Table 1, Broward County posted a 36 percent increase in the number of students enrolled in AP classes (5,352 to 7,301) and a 48 percent increase in the number of AP exams administered (8,967 to 13,260). In comparison, across the Globe, there was a 17 percent increase in the number of students enrolled and a 19 percent increase in the number of AP exams administered. Statewide, there was a 31 percent increase in the number of students enrolled and a 35 percent increase in the number of AP exams administered.

Although Broward is experiencing an increase in the number of AP students and exams administered, the total number of AP students (7,301) comprises only ten percent of the district total high school enrollment. Results of the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) have been used successfully in identifying academically promising students for participation in AP courses. PSAT results should continue to be examined to ensure that all eligible high school students are enrolled in AP courses.




As presented in Table 1, the number of students enrolled in AP courses has increased across the Globe, for Florida, and in Broward each year from 2001-02 to 2002-03 and from 2002-03 to 2003-04. When focusing on Broward, Chart 1 illustrates growth of 1,213 additional students

from 2001-02 to 2002-03 (from 5,352 to 6,565) and 736 additional students from 2002-03 to 2003-04 (from 6,565 to 7,301). Regarding the number of AP exams as presented in Table 1, an increasing trend is noted for district, state, and globe over the same three-year timeframe. When reviewing Chart 1 in reference to the number of examinations in Broward from 2001-02 through 2003-04, increases are clearly depicted. The 2001-02 number of 8,967 examinations soared to 11,586 (+2,619) in 2002-03 and rose even further to 13,260 (+1,674) in 2003-04. As many students are enrolled in multiple AP courses and therefore participate in more than one AP examination, the number of examinations exceeds the number of students enrolled.

AP Mean Scores and Number and Percent of Scores 3 and Above. Table 2 provides a comparison of AP mean scores, the number of AP scores 3 and above, and the percent of AP scores 3 and above for Global, Florida, and Broward participants from 2001-02 through 2003-04. Chart 2 illustrates the proportion of scores 3 and above for Global, Florida, and Broward. Data in Table 2 is reported as released by the *College Board AP Distribution Report*.

As shown in Table 2, the number of AP examinations with scores of 3 and above has steadily increased during the three-year period reported in the table. However, as indicated in the table and Chart 2, the percent of AP examination scores of 3 and above has declined during the same time period. Additionally, as seen in Table 2, the 2003-04 mean scores for Broward, Florida, and globally remained stable from the previous year with no change in Broward (2.70 vs. 2.70) or globally (2.96 vs. 2.96). A slight increase is seen across Florida (2.70 vs. 2.69).

Findings – Broward by Ethnicity

In general, Broward students continue to demonstrate success in the most rigorous of high school coursework, Advanced Placement. However, it is important to note that research indicates there is still evidence of gaps in the achievement of diverse ethnic groups. Recognizing that participation in Advanced Placement courses is an important mechanism for closing the gap, this report includes an analysis of AP scores by ethnicity.




Figure 1. Advanced Placement Enrollment Rates by Ethnicity, Broward County, 2000-01 Through 2003-04

Number and Percent of Students Enrolled in AP Courses by Ethnicity, 2000-01 Through 2003-04. Student academic history records were extracted from the district's data warehouse to examine enrollment rates for Black, Hispanic, and White students for a four-year period from 2000-01 to 2003-04. The analysis focuses on these three ethnic groups, as these students represent the largest population of students in Broward County. As revealed in Table 3, the number and percent of students enrolling in these courses differs among the three ethnic groups examined. During each of the four school years examined, White students were more likely to enroll in Advanced Placement courses than were Hispanic or Black students. The longitudinal enrollment trends are displayed in Figure 1. Examination of these trends revealed an enrollment increase for each group, although the rate of increase differs among groups. Whereas White students registered a five percentage point enrollment rate increase, Hispanic and Black students registered increases of 3.6 and 2.1 percentage points, respectively, over the same time period.

Number of Students Participating in AP Examinations and Number of AP Examinations Administered by Ethnicity, 2001-02 Through 2003-04. As noted in Appendix A, on average, 95% of students enrolled in AP courses in Broward County participate in AP Exams. Table 4 presents the number of students in each ethnicity category participating in AP examinations and the accompanying proportion of those students out of the district total, where applicable. The data is reported as released from *The College Board School Distribution by Ethnic Group Report*. In addition, the table reports number of AP examinations by ethnicity, with an average number of exams per student calculation provided in parentheses. Data are provided by College Board for the 2001-02 through 2003-04 school years. Although all ethnic categories as identified by the College Board are included in the table, the narrative below focuses only on the three categories of African American/Black, Hispanic/Puerto Rican, and White, as these students represent the largest population of students in Broward County.

As noted in Table 4, all three major groups of African American/Black, Hispanic/Puerto Rican, and White students demonstrate gains in the number of AP participants. The average number of AP examinations per student increased slightly for White students this year from the previous year, while the average number of examinations per student for African American/Black students and Hispanic/Puerto Rican students remained steady.

Considering the proportion of AP participants by ethnicity in light of overall high school enrollment for 2003-04, African American/Black students remained underrepresented in AP classes, while Hispanic/Puerto Rican and White students were highly represented. That is, 37 percent of the high school student body in 2003-04 was African American/Black while only 15 percent of AP enrollees were African American/Black. The reverse is seen for Hispanic/Puerto Ricans who made up 22 percent of Broward's high school population and 26 percent of AP participants and for White students who made up 37 percent of 9th to 12th graders

across the district and who represent 43 percent of those in AP classes. However, it should be noted that the proportional representation of African American/Black students has remained steady from 2001-02 (14% of participants) to 2003-04 (15%).

When the data is examined over the course of the three-year period shown in the table above, the highest proportional increase in AP participation occurred among Hispanic/Puerto Rican students and African American/Black students. Among Hispanic/Puerto Rican students, the increase in student participation in AP examinations from 2001-02 to 2003-04 was 700 students, representing a 59% increase over the three-year timeframe. Among African American/Black students, an additional 370 students participated in AP exams, representing a 50% increase in the time period. In comparison, among White students, an additional 724 students participated in AP examinations, representing only a 31% increase over the number of participants in 2001-02, and among Asian American/Asian students, an additional 153 students participated in AP examinations, representing a 37% increase over 2001-02.

AP Mean Scores, Number of AP Scores 3 and Above, and Percent of AP Scores 3 and Above, 2001-02 Through 2003-04. Table 5 presents average AP scores, number of AP scores 3 and above and percent of AP scores 3 and above by ethnicity for Broward over the past three years. Again, all data by ethnicity categories included in the table are as reported by the College Board. Discussion regarding findings will focus on the major categories of African American/Black, Hispanic/Puerto Rican, and White.

As the number of students participating increases it is expected that a decrease in mean scores will result. As displayed in Table 5, the number of scores 3 and above has increased significantly each year from 2001-02 through 2003-04. However, while mean scores and the percent of scores 3 and above decreased significantly from 2001-02 to 2002-03 they remained stable from 2002-03 to 2003-04.

As seen in Table 5, while mean AP scores for Hispanic/Puerto Rican and White students were above the district average for the past three years, only the Hispanic/Puerto Rican students' AP mean scores consistently surpassed all other groups reported at 3.27 in 2001-02, 2.96 in 2002-03 and 2.97 in 2003-04. African American/Black students fell below the district mean all three years (African American/Black: 2.33 in 2001-02, 2.11 in 2002-03, and 2.12 in 2003-04). Nonetheless, increases in the number of students scoring at 3 and above were noted for African American/Black students, Hispanic/Puerto Rican students, and White students over the past three years.

Subject Results

The AP Recap Report is attached as Appendix A. The report provides information by AP course from 2001-02 through 2003-04. Included is AP enrollment, AP examination participation, and 3 and above score data. Broward students participated in every AP subject area except one: International English. It is important to note that the number of exams in specified subject areas significantly increased from 2001-02 to 2002-03 and remained stable in 2003-04, as has the percent of AP exams administered. Additionally, the number of AP scores 3 and above has increased steadily over the three year period from 2001-02 to 2003-04. However, the percent of students scoring at 3 and above decreased dramatically in 2002-03 from the previous year while remaining stable in 2003-04.

As reported in Appendix A, of the 30 subject areas with sufficient numbers of students participating to allow reporting of data, the number of AP examinations administered over the past three years has increased in 27 AP subject areas and decreased in 3 areas. The number of students scoring at 3 and above increased in 23 subject areas and decreased in 7 subject areas, while the percent of students earning a score of 3 and above increased in 2 subject areas and decreased in 28 subject areas. The findings are as follows:

- Increases in the number of AP examinations, the number scoring 3 and above, and the percent scoring 3 and above are noted in one AP subject area (Statistics).
- Human Geography increased in the number of exam participants from 116 to 263, increased in the number of students scoring 3 and above from 74 to 166, and remained relatively stable in the percent of students scoring 3 above (63.8% to 63.1%). A similar finding is seen for World History, where the number of exam participants increased from 99 to 146, the number scoring 3 and above increased from 37 to 53, and the percent scoring 3 and above went from 37.4% to 36.3%.
- History of Art increased in number of exams from 89 to 145, increased in the number scoring 3 and above from 41 to 50, and decreased in percent scoring 3 and above from 46.1% to 34.5%.
- Chemistry increased number of exams from 266 to 425, increased number scoring 3 and above from 140 to 187, and decreased percent scoring 3 and above from 52.6% to 44.0%.
- Economics: Microeconomics increased number of exams from 74 to 175, increased number scoring 3 and above from 44 to 82, and decreased percent scoring 3 and above from 59.5% to 46.9%.
- Economics: Macroeconomics increased in number of exams from 36 to 291, increased number scoring 3 and above from 17 to 90, and decreased percent scoring 3 and above from 47.2% to 30.9%.

• Government & Politics: US increased number of examinations from 729 to 1,073, increased number scoring 3 and above from 414 to 422, and decreased percent scoring 3 and above from 56.8% to 39.3%.

Although it is expected that as the number of students participating increases, some decrease in percent of students scoring 3 and above will be evidenced, the decreases mentioned above are of statistical significance and warrant further attention.

Individual School Results

In reviewing individual school aggregate results included in Appendix B, significant improvement is noted from 2001-02 to 2003-04 at several schools when compared to district averages:

- Coconut Creek High School posted remarkable improvement in four areas: Number of AP Exams, Percent of AP Exams, Number of AP Exams 3 and above, and Percent of AP Exams 3 and above.
- William T. McFatter Technical reported considerable gains in four areas: Number of AP Students, Number of AP Exams, Number of AP Exams 3 and above, and Percent of AP Exams 3 and above
- Eight schools (Coral Springs Charter, Fort Lauderdale, Northeast, Pembroke Pines Charter, South Plantation, Stoneman Douglas, Stranahan, and Taravella) evidenced impressive improvement in the Number of AP Students, Number of AP Exams, and Number of AP Exams 3 and above.

As can be noted in Appendix B, there are several school findings that require attention:

- School Board Policy 6000.1 stipulates that students enrolled in AP classes are required to participate in the AP exam. Review of the participation rates provided in the Broward County AP Recap Report indicates that three one schools (Blanche Ely, Coral Springs, and Dillard) continues to fall short of district-wide averages in terms of the proportion of students participating in AP examinations out of the total number of students enrolled in AP courses.
- Several schools are evidencing decreases in participation rates and/or percent achieving 3 and above scores over the three-year timeframe.
- Charter School results show that although Somerset Academy has students who participate in the exams, no students are actually enrolled in AP classes. The percent of students who score at 3 or above continues to be below district averages at all charter schools. North Lauderdale Academy indicated an AP enrollment of 39, while no students scored at 3 or above.
- At Western High School, declines are seen in most areas during the three-year period. However, the opening of new high schools may have contributed to the decreasing numbers at Western.

For 2003-04 it is also noted that four schools (Atlantic Technical, Coconut Creek, Deerfield Beach, Wm. T. McFatter Technical) show a percent greater than 100 in the percent exams column. This finding is due to students in courses such as International Baccalaureate

(IB) and honors being allowed the opportunity to sit for the AP exam when they have not been enrolled in the AP course. District policy allows students who have participated in high rigor courses to sit for the exam based on school level approval.

Citizens Concerned about our Children (CCC) Agreement and AP Core Course Offerings In 1999, CCC and the School Board of Broward County entered into a legal agreement concerning the equality of opportunities and standards for all students across the district. Section five of the agreement specified the development of a core of AP and Honors courses to be available to students at all Broward County Public High Schools. These core courses ensure that all students have equal access to the same educational opportunities. In compliance with the Agreement, the Office of Research and Evaluation reviewed the AP and Honors course data to examine whether core course offerings were expanded to all high schools in December 2000. Findings demonstrated that nearly two-thirds (16) of the high schools offered the required AP core courses. A recommendation was made that "...area directors should work with principals of those high schools that do not meet the core requirements of the CCC Agreement to increase AP course offerings."

Appendix C provides a listing of all AP courses offered by school and highlights those specified in the CCC Agreement. AP core courses include the following classes: AP English Literature, AP English Language, AP Calculus AB, AP Biology, AP US History, and AP Spanish or AP French. Table 6 summarizes by school the status toward meeting the AP core course requirement in 2001-02 through 2002-03. Data indicates that 100% of Broward County High Schools with 9th through 12th grade enrollments offer students access to the full complement of Advanced Placement core courses through on-site offerings or via distance learning opportunities. The three schools (Atlantic Technical, Everglades, and Monarch) that presently do not offer all of the core AP courses are continuing to add AP courses each year as these schools add grade levels to their high school programs. The two comprehensive high school programs which opened their doors in 2003-04 (Everglades High and Monarch High) are expected to be at full compliance no later than the 2006-07 school year. Coral Glades High, which opened its doors this year, is expected to be at full compliance by the 2007-08 school year. Furthermore, as shown in Appendix C, the majority of high schools provide AP course offerings that extend well beyond the core AP curriculum courses, with 27 schools (93%) offering nine or more AP courses and two high schools (Charles Flanagan and Stoneman Douglas) each offering 26 Advanced Placement courses to students.

Appendix D provides individual school data from 2001-02 to 2003-04. The tables disaggregate by ethnicity and report overall school enrollment, AP course enrollment, and number scoring 3 and above on the AP examinations.

Actions Underway and Proposed Next Steps

In an effort to expand AP offerings, to increase student participation in AP courses, and to increase student scores of 3 and above on those assessments, staff has implemented a range of actions to reach these targets. Several actions are noted below:

Ongoing Actions

- Uniform entrance criteria to advanced courses have been established districtwide. Schools may not add to or subtract from the prerequisites required by the state for advanced courses.
- A district "parent preference" form has been developed to allow parents to place their children in advanced coursework on a probationary basis.
- Parents of 8th and 9th grade students receive district developed correspondence explaining high school advanced academic options including AP, dual enrollment, and honors coursework. Parents are asked to encourage their children to visit with the guidance counselor for further information.
- Beginning in 2004-05, all 10th grade students are required to take the PSAT. The precollege entrance examinations are analyzed by the College Board. School reports are provided to identify those students who are deemed capable of succeeding in AP coursework based on test results. The data are used for guidance and course selection activities.
- The College Board's Vertical Team initiative has been implemented districtwide and is continuously reinforced through staff development at the annual Advanced Academics Summer Institute.
- Broward has been an active participant in staff development activities sponsored by the Florida Partnership for Student Achievement, a contract for services between Florida Department of Education and The College Board.
- Broward has been a host site for several College Board workshops and through that effort has
 involved a greater number of local teachers and guidance counselors in the staff development
 activities.
- Student Predictions Flags have been added to the Data Warehouse to identify students who may be ready for AP classes as well as those who may be nearly ready and for whom some extra assistance may prove to make the difference. School staffs review the prediction flags and encourage students to participate as appropriate. Access to the Virtual Counselor by school personnel and parents aids in the identification of eligible students.
- Master course schedules are reviewed by Area Directors to ensure the full complement of AP
 core courses is offered at each school site and that when a core course cannot be offered;
 students are encouraged to participate in a distance learning program.

Proposed New Actions

- All teachers newly assigned to teach AP courses and/or those with below 50% passing rates should participate in the Advanced Academics Summer Institute which will be provided in 2005 by the Department of Advanced Academic Programs. In addition, curriculum staff should provide on-going support to schools with 50% or less passing rates.
- Entrance criteria to all AP courses should be reviewed annually by Area staff on a school-by-school basis to ensure equity and uniformity of access to AP courses by all students.
- The Student Assessment & School Performance Department will collaborate with Research Services and Education Technology Services (ETS) to ensure that the student prediction

- readiness flag reports and the PSAT test results are both available by March for reference when completing student schedules for the coming school year. These data should be used conjointly to identify those students who are capable of succeeding in AP coursework and to ensure that identified students are appropriately enrolled in AP classes.
- After the 10 Day Count, Research Services will provide to Area Superintendent and schools students identified as ready for AP classes who are not enrolled in an AP course.

APPENDIX D

The School Board of Broward County Advanced Placement Recap Report

Appendix D provides individual school test results by ethnicity for the three-year period from 2001-02 to 2003-04. The first column of the table documents the total high school enrollment for each school site, the number of students in each ethnicity category enrolled at the school, and the corresponding proportion of those students out of the school's total enrollment for the three major ethnic groups of African American/Black, Hispanic/Puerto Rican, and White students. The second column in the table presents the number of students enrolled in AP courses for the total school and each ethnicity category, with the accompanying proportion of those students out of the school total for the three major ethnic groups. The third and final column of this table provides the number of AP examinations that were scored three and above for the school as a whole and for each ethnicity category, with the accompanying proportion of those students out of the school total for the three major ethnic groups. Data reported in Appendix D is from the *Broward County Advanced Placement Recap Report*.

Because the data reflected in Appendix D requires further interpretation, an example, using the data from Blanche Ely High School, is provided. As noted in Appendix D, Blanche Ely High School had 2,544 students enrolled in the 2001-02 school year, 2,670 students in the 2002-03 school year, and 2,570 students enrolled in the 2003-04 school year. In the 2003-04 school year, 80% of the school's population was African American/Black (2,066 students), 9% of the school's population was Hispanic/Puerto Rican (221 students), and 8% of the school's population was White (194 students).

In that same school year, Blanche Ely High School had 180 students enrolled in Advanced Placement courses. In the 2003-04 school year, 48% of the school's AP enrollment was African American/Black (87 students), 18% of the school's AP enrollment was Hispanic/Puerto Rican (32 students), and 16% of the school's AP enrollment was White (29 students). In this instance, there is a discrepancy by ethnicity group when the school's total enrollment is compared to the school's AP course enrollment. Specifically, while African American/Black students comprised 80% of Blanche Ely's overall school enrollment, these students reflected only 48% of the school's AP course enrollment. In contrast, while Hispanic/Puerto Rican students and White students comprised only 17% of the school's total enrollment (9% and 8% respectively), these ethnic groups made up 34% of the school's AP enrollment (18% and 16% respectively). These ethnic groups were represented in AP courses in twice the frequency than their representation in the overall school population.

Lastly, in the 2003-04 school year, Blanche Ely High School has 181 AP examinations scored at three and above. In that school year, 34% of the scores of three and above were earned by African American/Black students (62 exams), 19% of the scores of three and above were earned by Hispanic/Puerto Rican students (34 exams), and 21% of the scores of three and above were earned by White students (38 exams). Again, this data shows that there is a discrepancy by ethnicity group when the school's total enrollment is compared to the number of AP examinations that are scored at three and above. While African American/Black students comprised 80% of Blanche Ely's overall school enrollment, these students represented only 34% of the school's AP scores of three and above. In contrast, while Hispanic/Puerto Rican students and White students comprised only 17% of the school's total enrollment (9% and 8% respectively), these ethnic groups made up 40% of the school's AP scores of three and above (19% and 21% respectively). These ethnic groups accounted for more than twice the frequency of AP scores of three and above than expected based on their representation in the overall school population.
